Learners will explore interdisciplinary literature validating the role of kindness in health promotion. Learners also will explore challenges, opportunities and best practices for offering culturally-safe kindness in a culturally diverse health care environment.

## **Course Outcomes:**

• To help caregivers deepen their ability to address kindness within themselves, their clients, and their workplaces.

- To create a critical mass of professionals within nursing and other disciplines who have the skills, knowledge, attitudes & support necessary to exemplify kindness.
- To develop future leaders who can help create an inclusive healthcare culture that tends to the needs of clients and caregivers alike.

#### **Course Topics:**

A variety of learning approaches will provide opportunities for participants to deepen their ability to address kindness within themselves, their clients, and their workplaces. Learning activities include contemplative reflection with a wide range of learning resources: videos, audio and readings. Weekly interaction with others in an assigned group will provide participants with the opportunity to practice kindness and gain skills in exemplifying kindness.

#### **Evaluation:**

Evaluative components of this course include:

- Weekly Assignments 60% (Mandatory)
- Shared Learning Assignment 20%
- Contemplative Assignment 20%

<u>ALL</u> evaluative components must be completed and submitted for grading in order to receive a final grade in the course.
